John Anderson, former Deputy Prime Minister of Australia, was the keynote speaker. All participants enjoyed the warm welcome and hospitality of Australia. Our Arizona chapter was the proud recipient of the 2005-06 Golden Chapter Award from PTPI headquarters in Kansas City. The award is given to chapters who displayed growth, leadership, and member participation in local and world events. Margaret DuBois received the award on behalf of our chapter from President and CEO, Mary Jean Eisenhower and Joseph Patterson, chairman of PTPI's Board of Directors. The award was presented at the World Conference in Sydney, Australia.

Chapter Sponsored Travel in 07'

We are sponsoring a mixed age delegation trip to Poland, the Czech Republic and Hungary. We will be visiting and staying with chapter families in each of the countries as well as visiting the capitals: Warsaw, Prague and Budapest. We will be traveling by train and bus, staying with families and at hostels or pensiones with an approximate stay of one week in each country. Departure date is tentatively set for Saturday, May 26, and a return date of Friday, June 15, 2007. The total estimated cost to be \$2,900 for the three weeks. This includes all transportation, accommodations, entrance fees and two meals a day.
